Sometimes a person may also be a "Jr., Sr., II, or III This is important information for our system to have. Without this we cannot keep accurate records. For example, there are too many "John Smiths" and Betty Drawdys to know which one you are referring to without complete information. Finally, fill in the box that asks for whom we are to send the certificates.

The same thing applies when ordering books. Who is facilitating? Where? When does the session start? Name of book using & how many facilitator guides and group guides are needed, as well as who is receiving them and, of course, their address.

Our heart's desire is for us to reach out with our materials and watch God touch and change lives forever.


Our next Online Leader Training is Saturday, November 4. You may sign up online at <u>https://</u><u>familyintegrity.org</u>

What Do We Need to Do this Ministry? Part 3 Courage

After putting my feelings aside, the next activity was the action step. The going to the prison, staring at the fences with the barbed wire, walking through the first gate, getting into the block house, making sure I left everything considered as contraband in the car. Once my articles were X-Rayed, I went through the metal detector, around an electronic "sniffer" and then was patted down. I was given a badge and a device designed to go off if the pin was removed. After exiting the block house and a few more gates, I was in the general population. I finally got used to the abrupt "Clang!" when the gate locked. At that point, I headed to the Chapel or the dorms. There were times when the hairs on the back of my neck went up. Compassion kept me going. Courage was supplied by compassion. God was with me. He would work it out.

At times, saying that you go to prisons and community centers teaching life skills receives unusual responses from fellow Christians. Some look at you like you have grown a third eye. Others quickly dismiss your statement and change the subject. Sometimes the unspoken word is "why?". I did that once. There is a misunderstanding of the importance of our ministry and sometimes they haven't gotten past that all need God's love and forgiveness in their lives. The appreciation shown by those served tell me that I am where I should be. The way we present the courses reflect respect to all who come in.

We need more to do this ministry, but the first step is to have compassion, then courage. Next month I will talk about the third "C" word, Commitment.
